





Dear Troop Leader and Scouts;

My name is Jerry Bayus. I am a BSA Counselor for the Scuba Diving and First Aid Merit Badges. In the past, I have sent out mailings introducing the Scuba Diving Merit Badge to Scouts. I was disappointed in the lack of enthusiasm that I received. In particular, comments that the Scuba Diving Merit Badge was too expensive for a scout and/or that other events had already been planned for the year. The Scuba Diving Merit Badge has even been compared to other merit badges like Camping. I guess if you as Scoutmaster/Leader (or a scout and his family) looks at it simply as a "Merit Badge", then yes, I could agree that it would be a costly endeavor.

When I first started Scuba Diving, I never looked at it as a "one-time" event. My plan was to keep diving, particularly on vacations, etc. A year later, my daughter, then age 11 wanted to learn and together it was an activity that her and I shared. Our training continued, first thru advanced open water. I then went on to Rescue, Divemaster and ultimately am an Instructor today. My hope is that Scout Leaders will look at the Scuba Diving Merit Badge as something more than 'just' a merit badge and introduce it to scouts, their friends, their families, as something that they can and may enjoy together for a lifetime. A scout learning scuba can lead to a multitude of career interests such as commercial diving and various marine sciences, research and ocean conservation.

I have enclosed literature that explains in more depth what is entailed in achieving Open Water Scuba Certification, the Merit Badge requirements and a brochure that more fully outlines my credentials and what I teach. I commit to help Scouts thru <u>all</u> of the requirements for completing the Scuba Diving Merit Badge as required by BSA standards. Others may only offer the "scuba certification" requirement of the merit badge, leaving all the other requirements for troop leaders to finish. The Merit Badge can take as little as two months to complete or could take up to a year if a scout so chooses to work on it at a relaxed pace.

The Scuba Diving merit badge can be combined with the First Aid Merit Badge. Though not required for the First Aid merit badge, I teach basic life support, CPR and AED classes, with participants earning BLS/CPR certifications. If a scout has interest in our oceans and ocean conservation, the PADI Project AWARE scuba certification can give a scout an extensive level of knowledge in this area also.

The cost for Open Water Scuba classes is \$350. Additionally, each participant must own or purchase their own mask, snorkel, fins and fin boots, which run approximately \$250-\$300 depending on the gear chosen. Class cost can be paid over the duration of the open water certification course. All other scuba equipment required to complete the course is provided to students to use throughout their certification. I add NO additional cost to completing the remaining requirements of the Merit Badge.

Thank you in advance for looking over the enclosed materials and again, I hope that you will consider introducing the Scuba Diving Merit Badge to the Scouts in your Troop along with their families.

In addition to the agencies listed by name, any current member of the World Recreational Scuba Training Council (WRSTC) is also recognized.

Each approved instructor must follow the training protocols established by his or her authorizing agency, including limitations and special provisions based on medical conditions and age. For Scout divers under age 15, this will include restrictions for maximum depth, buddies, and supervision ratios.

Scuba industry standards for Open Water Diver Certification require the student to be at least 15 years of age. Students under the minimum age who meet open water scuba performance requirements may qualify for a special certification that allows them to dive with an adult buddy who has, as a minimum, an open water scuba certification. Several of the scuba organizations recognized by the BSA offer "junior" open water certifications for those as young as 10; others have a minimum age of 12. Such junior open water diver certifications satisfy Scuba Diving merit badge requirement 4.

When scuba diving is taught in connection with any local council program, such as offering the Scuba Diving merit badge at summer camp, instructors should provide the training on a contract basis. Such instructors should have dive store or other commercial affiliation that provides liability coverage. Direct employment of scuba instructors is not recommended.

Local council programs may not compress or sell air for scuba use, or sell, rent, or loan scuba equipment (scuba cylinders, regulators, gauges, dive computers, weights, BCDs).

All air and scuba equipment for local council use must be obtained from professional sources (dive stores, resorts, dive boats, etc.) affiliated with a scuba agency recognized by the BSA.

Requirements

- 1. Do the following:
 - a. Show that you know first aid for injuries or illnesses that could occur while scuba diving, including hypothermia, hyperventilation, squeezes, decompression illness, nitrogen narcosis, motion sickness, fatigue, overexertion, heat reactions, dehydration, injuries by aquatic life, and cuts and scrapes.
 - Identify the conditions that must exist before performing CPR on a person, and explain how to recognize such conditions.
 Demonstrate the proper technique for performing CPR using a training device approved by your counselor.
- 2. Before completing requirements 3 through 6, earn the Swimming merit badge.
- 3. Discuss the Scuba Diver's Code with your merit badge counselor, and explain the importance of each guideline to a scuba diver's safety.
- 4. Earn an Open Water Diver Certification from a scuba organization recognized by the Boy Scouts of America scuba policy.
- 5. Explain what an ecosystem is, and describe four aquatic ecosystems a diver might experience.
- Find out about three career opportunities in the scuba industry. Pick
 one and find out the education, training, and experience required for
 this profession. Discuss this with your counselor, and explain why
 this profession might interest you.

The Boy Scouts of America is not a dive certification agency. Your merit badge counselor can help you find a scuba agency recognized by the Boy Scouts of America scuba policy so that you can fulfill requirement 4.

Scouts who have already earned an Open Water Diver Certification outside of a BSA activity from a scuba agency recognized by the Boy Scouts of America scuba policy may still earn the Scuba Diving merit badge by earning the Swimming merit badge and completing all other listed requirements.

Note to the Scuba Diving Merit Badge Counselor

All scuba instruction must be conducted by recreational diving instructors in good standing with a scuba agency recognized by the Boy Scouts of America and approved by the BSA local council.

Counselors for the Scuba Diving merit badge must be registered with the Boy Scouts of America and be approved by the district/council advancement committee.



Like other merit badges, the Scuba Diving merit badge has been developed to teach and train youth in a manner consistent with the overall goals and values of the Boy Scouts of America. The merit badge counselor should be fair and consistent when presenting and evaluating the knowledge and skills specified by the requirements. None of the requirements may be modified or omitted.

Unlike many other merit badges, the Scuba Diving critical prerequisites, knowledge, and skills are not itemized in the requirements nor adequately covered in this pamphlet.

The requirement to earn Open Water Diver Certification means the Scout must meet training requirements set by outside agencies

and must supplement the material in the pamphlet with an entrylevel scuba diver manual.

All phases of scuba instruction—classroom, pool, and open water training—must comply with the minimum training standards for entry-level scuba certification adopted by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) or the U.S. Recreational Scuba Training Council (RSTC). The RSTC is recognized as the ANSI Accredited Standards Developer for recreational diving instructional standards. The BSA acknowledges those standards by limiting scuba instruction only to instructors trained and sanctioned by recognized scuba agencies.

Agencies recognized by the BSA for scuba training are **PADI** (Professional Association of Diving Instructors); **NAUI** (National Association of Underwater Instructors); **SSI** (Scuba Schools International);

IDEA (International Diving Educators Association); **PDIC** (Professional Diving Instructors Corporation); and **SDI** (Scuba Diving International).

PADI Open Water Certification Course offered by Jerry Bayus and Rec*TEC* Divers

Cost of complete course is \$350 and includes all classroom materials and books, pool fees, instructor fees, certification card and all scuba gear except personal snorkeling gear as outlined below.

Classroom and Pool Sessions

Open Water Scuba Diver Certification with Rec*TEC* Divers involves an average of 12hrs academic classroom instruction and 12hrs pool instruction, then one weekend of Open Water Diving at a local fresh water quarry. Scheduling is flexible, based upon class needs and students schedules. Cost includes textbooks and related materials, pool fees, instructor fees, certification card and all scuba gear EXCEPT snorkeling gear. Each student will need their own personal snorkeling equipment (mask, fins, fin boots, snorkel), of quality suitable for scuba. I provide recommendations and assist you with gear purchases. Students receive discounts on all gear purchases. Classroom sessions are held either at Rec*TEC* Divers in Cortland and/or at the pool facility where your pool sessions are held. Pool sessions are commonly held at the Hubbard Community Pool. Rec*TEC* Divers may also utilize a number of other area pool facilities.

Open Water Dives

Your Scuba Certification isn't complete until you perform 4 Open Water Dives in an actual "Open Water Environment". These dives are required for certification and allow you to demonstrate skills learned in the pool. For this we plan a weekend and travel west, to White Star Quarry in Gibsonburg, OH and Gilboa Quarry, outside of Findlay, OH. We plan to spend a day at each quarry, as each provides a unique underwater dive experience. Both Quarry's are exclusively designed for Open Water Dive Training and feature training platforms and underwater attractions. Visibility at the Quarry's commonly range from 40ft up to 80ft or more. Oxygen First Aid for Scuba Diving Injuries

- Recognize a dive injury
- Respond with emergency oxygen first aid
- Relay with emergency medical service (EMS and DAN)

Entry level training to better recognize possible diverelated injuries and to provide emergency oxygen first aid while activating the local emergency medical services



Advanced Oxygen First Aid for Scuba Diving Injuries

Trains participants to use the MTV-100 (flow-restricted, oxygen powered ventilator) or Bag Valve Mask while providing care for non-breathing injured divers. This is an additional training module for DAN Oxygen Providers.



Basic Life Support and First Aid

Basic Life Support, or BLS, includes airway management skills such as the log roll and recovery position, one rescuer cardiopulmonary resuscitation and additional skills like caring for a choking patient, controlling bleeding and caring for a patient in shock. The first aid portion of this program includes key skills such as illness and injury assessments, bandaging and splinting skills and emergency moves.



DAN Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) for Scuba Diving

More than 10 percent of all dive fatalities are actually caused by cardiovascular disease, according to DAN dive accident and fatality statistics. This course teaches divers and other interested parties to provide care for sudden cardiac arrest including the use of an automated external defibrillator (AEDs).
